Tree Dressing Day Content from Woodland Trust & Common Ground



Obviously, December is associated with decorating and bejewelling Christmas trees in the front room. This festival, however, specifically focuses on living trees and the fact that they are vital to life on earth. Trees are essential weapons in our battle against climate change. According to Earthday.org, trees absorb <u>one-third of global emissions every year.</u> Here in the UK, if we planted more native trees, we could encourage woodland that is genetically diverse and resilient against pests, diseases and the effects of climate change. Depending on the species, trees can live for thousands of years. It's no wonder then that they've long been celebrated in folklore around the world. Think of the scenes that ancient trees might have witnessed!

Trees have long been celebrated for their spiritual significant. The simplicity of tying ribbons, strips of cloth or yarn to a tree is universal and timeless. The old Celtic custom of tying cloth dipped in water from a holy well to a "cootie tree" echoes the practice in Japan of decorating trees with strips of paper (tanazaku) bearing wishes and poems.

A trend which has recently come about is that of 'yarn bombing' where people decorate trees with bright fabrics and yarns. This echoes the Buddhist tradition of tying ribbons around the trunk of the Bodhi tree in homage to Buddha. Similarly, during the annual Hindu festival of Raksha Bandhan, coloured strings are tied onto trees and plants to call upon the power of nature to protect loved ones.



In Hong Kong two banyan trees are visited during the Lunar New Year, and burnt joss sticks attached to a wish and an orange is thrown up in to the trees believing that if the paper successfully hangs onto a branch, the wish will come true. In Glasgow, a number of trees have been planted onto which people can tie white labels which feature their wishes.



Tree Dressing Day falls on the first weekend of December. It was initiated by Common Ground in 1990. This weekend was deliberately chosen as it is an extension of National Tree week (end of November/ start of December) and occurs prior to the Christmas school holidays so that schools may participate in community activities as an alternative to Nativity Plays. It has grown to become much more than an expression of love for trees. It is a chance for communities to reflect on the cultural and social history of their local area.

We risk losing trees from our lives unless we express how important they are and how much we appreciate them. That's why the Woodland Trust launched their campaign to create a Charter of Trees, Woods and People which joins over 50 organisations, including City of Trees forming hundreds of local communities into a national movement for trees, speaking out for them and ensuring their value in society is recognized and protected for the future.

So, next year, don't limit your tree decorating skills to your front room. Your children or grandchildren will really enjoy making meaningful decorations to display on their living tree. Encourage them to get creative and use their imaginations. Here are some ideas to get them started:

- Make paper leaves to hang from your tree. Children could colour them in and write messages or poems on them.
- Cut lengths of colourful ribbons and tie them to branches so they ripple in the breeze or tie them around your tree.
- Make your own bunting by cutting out paper triangles and attaching them to ribbon. Use the bunting to tell a story children could draw pictures showing the wildlife that lives in the tree or how people enjoy it. When it's finished, wrap the bunting around the trunk.
- Use fallen leaves and seeds to make natural garlands and decorations.



Do not damage the tree by using nails to fasten your decorations onto the tree. Remember to remove all your dressings at the end of the weekend so that no damage is due to the wild life that live in trees.
